Business boomed, as Prohibition was in force in the U.S. Local businessman Ernest Dann who had operated a bicycle repair and radio shop next door, bought the building in 1931. The business became a family business, as son Alan Dann took



over in 1973. In its heyday, Dann's sold radios, televisions, bicycles, phonograph records. household The appliances. business was closed and the building sold in 2013, thus ending 82 years of the continuous family run business.

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Hormone Imbalances, Accelerated Aging, and **Testing**

Hormonal imbalances can be a significant contributor to premature aging. However, HRT is not without controversy. It comes with potential risks, including an increased risk of breast cancer. Therefore, it is essential to consider the individual's health status, risk factors, and preferences when considering HRT as an anti-aging strategy. Close monitoring and personalized treatment plans are crucial for optimizing benefits while minimizing risks. A good starting point can be to do a DUTCH test.

A DUTCH test, which stands for "Dried Urine Test for Comprehensive Hormones," is a type of hormone test that measures the levels of various hormones and their metabolites in your body using dried urine samples collected several times throughout the day and night over a 24-hour period. It measures the following:

• Sex Hormones: It measures hormones like estrogen, progesterone, DHEA, and testosterone, as well as their metabolites, which can provide insights into hormone production and metabolism.

- Adrenal Hormones: It assesses adrenal function by measuring hormones like cortisol and cortisone, which are involved in the body's stress response.
- Melatonin: This hormone is involved in regulating sleep-wake cycles and is often included to assess sleep-related issues.
- Neurotransmitter Metabolites: Measuring neurotransmitter metabolites can provide insights into mood and mental health. It's important to note that the DUTCH test is often used in functional medicine and integrative medicine practices to guide personalized treatment plans. If you're considering this test, it's advisable to consult with a healthcare provider who is experienced in interpreting the results and can recommend appropriate interventions if any hormone imbalances are detected. 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Toaster Oven Baked Spring Rolls I don't know about you but I love spring on my cutting board and put a big table.

I don't know about you but I love spring rolls and recently I started making my own. I found it quite easy to make using just basic ingredients. I start with the wraps I get them at No Frills in the freezer section.



You can use a bit of water or egg wash to seal the


end. I repeat this until all the filling is gone. I usually get about 25 - 30 rolls out of package of meat. I do a 50/50 mix of veggies to meat. Next I place them on a piece of tin foil on a baking pan and then put them into my toaster oven. It takes about 20 minutes on high to brown

them. Another way to brown them would be in an air fryer but I don't have one of those yet. Then I put the next batch in or I put them into a zip lock bag and freeze them for another day.

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
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Should you get winter Tires?

It's A Yearly Decision!

Back in the day every winter just about everyone who owned a vehicle swapped out their summer tires for winter tires. Now, not as

many people do. The reasons vary from the cost of an extra set of snow tires to the fact that our winters aren't that bad anymore. The reason we need winter tires is that all season tires

have rubber that hardens as temperatures drop below 7 C. Tire rubber must be flexible to grip the road. At 7C, an all-season and a winter tires have about the same traction. As the thermometer drops, the winter tire gains grip and the all-season loses it.

Now that it's October, in BC if you travel outside of the lower mainland you are required to have winter tires otherwise you may be turned around and or get a fine.

Here is a look at the various types of tires on the market today.

Summer tires are ideal for high-performance vehicles, and are built for speed and agility. Specialized tread patterns and rubber compounds that allow for improved precision on the road. They are designed to provide maximum road-holding grip. Not the greatest in rain.

The all-season tire - Most Common - In the summer, it has less traction than a dedicated summer tire. In the winter, it has less traction than a winter tire. Basically a jack of all trades master of none but pretty good in the rain.

The all-weather tire - is an all-season tire

that has passed the Transport Canada snow test. It is essentially a winter tire that can be left on the car all year. They provide safe all-weather performance, but may not always be suitable for severe snow conditions. The all-weather tire uses rubber compounds similar to the winter tire but is made of sturdier rubber compounds so that it can also withstand the summer heat of highway driving. Unfortunately these tires do not last as long as all season tires because the rubber is much softer.

Winter tires are designed with special materials that stay soft to provide maximum traction in temperatures below 45 degrees. Winter tires also have tread patterns designed to grip snow, ice, and slush-covered roads better

than any all-season tire.

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MUST USE

WINTER TIRES

So which tires are the best overall. Here are some test results I found online.

On wet and dry freezing pavement, the all-weather tire is more stable and stops surer than a true winter tire. In heavy slush both tires work equally well. The all season falls short in all catagories except hot, dry conditions.

Braking distance on ice and snow. The all-weather tires stopped 42.4 per cent shorter than the all-season tires. And the dedicated winter tires stopped 15.3 per cent shorter than the all-weather group. And winter tires required 57.7% shorter distance than all season tires. So what do these numbers mean, in simple math. At 50km say it takes 100 feet to stop on ice/snow with all season tires. A dedicated snow tire will, in theory, stop in 57.7 feet sooner and the M&S or all weather tire will stop 42.4 ft sooner than the all season tires. Winter Tires Win, If you can afford them go with winter tires. All-weather tires come a close second. I went with all weather tires on my truck as well I have chains.

Winterize Your Toys

With fall here and unpredictable weather on it's way there are many people who are starting to winterizing all their toys. Top of the "toys" list would be boats, motorcycles and rv's. If you don't have indoor storage for your toys. There are places around who offer it, it's fairly pricey though. If you're like most of us who can't afford indoor storage, don't just cover them and leave them sitting. There's a long list of "to do" items when







winterizing, but there are a couple things that are the same for all. A good washing and cleaning inside and out will save you a tone of work in the spring. If it's motorized, a full tank of gas, with added fuel stabilizer. If you do have to leave your boat or RV outside, keep it properly covered to protect it from the elements. To protect engine internals from rust and corrosion, spray fogging oil down the carburetor with the engine running until it stalls. Before you stow away your boat and RV for the winter, it is important that all water is removed from your water cooling systems,

including in your outboard motor. Check your owners manual or dealer for all that you should do for your boat, motorcycle or RV. If your toy uses water, don't forget the plumb-



ing antifreeze for your water systems and drain you water tanks too. On my trailers I also like to lift my jacks up so that all the weight is off the tires, this prevents flat spots on the tires. and put a dehumidifier inside, it keeps the dampness out. Don't for get your lawn mower and gas trimmers either. Don't put it off winter is coming. Don't forget if you are driving outside the lower mainland you need snow tires. They are manditory. On cold and rainy days focus on the inside of your home. Check for drafts and look for areas around doors and windows that could use some weather stripping and don't forget to check your door sweeps.

Here is an article I wrote in 2017 and it Have your furnace inspected. Hire an HVAC professional to test for leaks, check heating efficiency, and change the filter. It's also a good idea to stock up on extra

> air filters and change them every few months. Get a carbon monoxide detector and install it near your furnace if you don't have one. Now is also a good time to have your ducts cleaned.

If your home has central air conditioning, it may be a good idea to cover your outdoor unit for winter. If you use window air conditioning units, remove them. Buy a programmable thermostat, if you don't

your thermostat to lower the temperature automatically at night and when you're not home, can result in substantial cost savings. Test home safety devices. Replace the batteries in all smoke detectors and carbon monoxide devices and test to make sure they're working properly. Clean humidifiers if you have them on your furnace. Vinegar is inexpensive and works well. On nice days head outside. Do a roof check. You should be able to do at least a visual inspection of the roof from the ground. Grab some binoculars to get a closer look or if you're able and can do so safely, get a ladder and climb on up for a better view. Look for missing, damaged, curled or loose shingles, inspect your gutters at the same time. Check the chimney and fireplace flashings. If you have a wood fireplace and use it, have your chimney cleaned and inspected by a professional. Inspect your siding. Check for cracks or holes. Repair them. Clean the gutters. The leaves haven't really started falling yet but it's coming. I have to clean my gutters several times every year. It's a pain but necessary. Also check your downspouts, they need to be clear and direct water away from foundations, walkways, and driveways. Add extensions to downspouts if necessary. Make sure they are properly attached. Check the seals around all doors and windows, recaulk them if they are cracked. If you have inground sprinklers, drain them. Put away seasonal furniture. Get your fall and winter equipment ready. Power outages are becoming regular yearly events. When the fall and early winter storms blow in it can get nasty. One year we were without power for over a week, I lost \$350 - \$400 worth of food you couldn't buy a generator anywere. I've had to use mine

every year since. Keep them in good working order, use fresh gas and have extra on

before Richard and Bruce lost their wealth, and Bruce did not expect Richard to need a significant financial support from him.

Bruce's estate was also very modest, to the point that if all of his estate was provided for Richard, it would only lift Richard and his sons out of poverty for a limited time.

The Court varied the will so that he received all of Bruce's estate.

The Court stated that Richard and his sons, Jason and Tim, had a significant financial need that outweighed Talia's needs. Talia had limited legal and moral entitlement to the estate, as Bruce and her relationship was a short one, and she did not depend on him financially; her business was doing well, and she was not affected by the countrywide financial crisis.

Furthermore, the size of Bruce's estate at his death was so modest that it could not be divided. Even getting

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
